India has the second highest number of maternal deaths in the world. Despite an increase in women giving birth in health facilities, maternal deaths are not decreasing as much as they should, largely due to insufficient care quality. Among private maternity providers, quality of care is inconsistent, there is no clear consensus on quality standards and there is no national system to assure quality.

Jhpiego India and the Federation of Obstetric and Gynaecological Societies of India (FOGSI) are partnering to improve the quality of maternity care in three states with particularly high numbers of maternal deaths and/or a strong private maternity provider presence. Based on the success of an initial pilot, these partners will launch the Manyata initiative, a national certification and quality improvement system to recognize private providers who consistently deliver quality care to the women they serve.



Scalable Quality Improvement:

With technical support from Jhpiego, FOGSI will implement a quality improvement (QI) model to help private maternity providers enhance their care and achieve certification for meeting national quality standards. This model—designed to be scaled across India—includes two components:



Quality Improvement Hubs: Up to 20 QI Hubs—similar to centers of excellence—will offer private maternity providers ongoing training and mentorship.



Quality Toolkit: The QI Hubs will use the Private Maternity Care Quality Toolkit, designed during the pilot phase, as the foundation for training providers and measuring the quality of their care.



Sustainable Quality Assurance

Once private maternity providers meet quality standards, they become eligible for national certification, which assures that providers continue to offer quality care.



Quality Certification: Private maternity providers who meet national quality standards (defined by FOGSI) will receive Manyata certification.



Sustainable Business Model: The project will design and test various business models to make the certification system self-sustaining after project funding ends.

By the end of the project in 2018, at least 200 providers will achieve certification and many more will be fulfilling requirements to meet the new national quality standards.
